Historically Speaking

I recently had the pleasure of visiting with William Shultes who served as the 56th President of the Central New York Chapter of ASHRAE during the 1981-82 year. Following are highlights of the interview:

ill was born and brought up in Middleburg, New York, south west of Albany, a small rural community of 1,400 people with no real job opportunities. He was the first in his family to go to college. His father worked at the General Electric factory in Schenectady building turbines. After high school he went to **Hudson Valley Community College** where he took Air Conditioning Technology. He graduated in 1968 with an Associate Degree in Applied Science, with a specialty in Air Conditioning. After graduation, his first job was working as an estimator for Loren V. Appleby, a manufacturers representative, in Albany, NY. Loren asked that Bill join ASHRAE and get involved in the local chapter as a way to get to know the engineers in the area and to become more familiar with the industry. In 1970, he was transferred to Syracuse to work with Bob Zoller in Appleby's Syracuse office, and was given the Utica, N.Y. sales territory. Business was good in the 70s with the ongoing construction of colleges, schools, hospitals and office buildings. After coming to Syracuse he joined the ASHRAE Central New York Chapter and became involved. He held several committee assignments as chairman for membership, education, newsletter, research promotion and refrigeration chairman and continued on, becoming Chapter President in 1981.

Bill's involvement with our industry spans 39 years, most of which was in several manufacturers rep. operations in the Syracuse area. Bill has been involved in promoting over 100 manufacturers products in our HVAC industry over the 39 years. At present he is a sales engineer with R. L. Kistler in their Syracuse office calling on area architects and consulting engineers. One item he is now selling is an induced air ventilation system, developed primarily for schools It uses a newly designed overhead induced air ventilation module called the "Q Terminal," on which he and Jim Miller, a Central NY chapter member and past president of twin tiers chapter, hold a patent. This new product is made in East

Syracuse by NuClimate Air Quality Systems and is currently being marketed thru out the United States by regional represen-

tatives who call on Architects and
Engineers. An application of this product is incorporated in the Syracuse
Central Tech renovation designed by
Thomas Associates. For the near
future when he expects to retire, Bill
has design thoughts of innovative
air filtration products to improve
Indoor Environmental Quality (IEQ)
that also save energy. He for sees the ventilation aspects of indoor space conditioning

becoming more important as our industry further embraces the benefits of improving IEQ.

ASHRAE is the backbone of our industry, as Bill sees it. He would advise young people and newcomers to the HVAC&R field to join ASHRAE and become involved as he did. He feels that programs on the technological advances of our industry, as well as the opportunity to meet and be with local people in the business, are just a couple of the important benefits of being a chapter member and attending ASHRAE chapter meetings. He sees ASHRAE as a real viable help in building a career in our industry.

Society President to Visit in February 2007


